
• A – G felony or any offense if previous adjudication

Everything


Offenses at 16/17

- A E felonies could be sent to juvenile court from superior court





Complaints Received by Race/Ethnicity


Complaints Received by Age <=10



CIVIL CASES WITH CRIMINAL LAW

*School-based offenses decreased in 2020 and 2021 largely due to the coronavirus pandemic and accompanying school closures.



- Prosecutor (District Attorney)
- Attorney for the juvenile
- The juvenile as respondent (and decision maker)
- The parent, guardian, or custodian of the juvenile
- Court counselors (DJJ)



Intake

- 1.Complaint to court counselor
- 2.Some must be filed as petitions in court, most can be closed, diverted, or approved for filing

Preliminary Procedures

- First appearance
- Probable Cause
- Capacity issues may be raised
- Discovery and negotiations may occur

ADJUDICATION

Is the juvenile responsible for the charged offense(s) beyond a reasonable doubt?

DISPOSITION

What should happen as a result of the adjudication?

Post - Disposition

- Violation hearings
- Other motions for review
- Termination of probation
- Termination of jurisdiction



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Range of Dispositional Options

No disposition (dismissal)

DSS custody

Probation supervision (with terms and conditions)

Community service

Restitution

Days in detention

Out of home non secure settings

Secure juvenile facilities



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
Detention Secure (cells that lock, barbed wire fencing)




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
SIGNIFICANT MENTAL HEALTH NEEDS AMONG JUSTICE-INVOLVED YOUTH

Trauma and Juvenile Justice

- > 2/3 justice-involved youth have complex histories of trauma "including exposure to neglect, emotional, physical, and sexual abuse, family and community violence, traumatic losses, and disrupted relationships with primary caregivers."
