208.06 CASTRATION OR OTHER MAIMING WITHOUT MALICE AFORETHOUGHT. FELONY.

The defendant has been charged with [castration] [maiming].

For you to find the defendant guilty of this offense, the State must prove two things beyond a reasonable doubt:

First, that the defendant [cut] [slit] [bit off] [cut off] [disabled] [maimed] [disfigured] the victim's [nose] [lip] [ear] [(*name limb*)] [(*name member*)] [(*name privy member*)], thereby permanently injuring him.

And Second, that the defendant did this on purpose and unlawfully with the intent to [kill] [maim] [disfigure] [disable] [render impotent]<sup>1</sup> the victim.

*NOTE WELL: If self-defense is an issue, use N.C.P.I.-Crim. 308.40 or 308.45, as appropriate.* 

If you find from the evidence beyond a reasonable doubt that on or about the alleged date, the defendant, on purpose and unlawfully with the intent to [kill] [maim] [disfigure] [disable] [render impotent] the victim [cut] [slit] [bit off] [cut off] [disabled] [maimed] [disfigured] the victim's (*name injured part of body*) thereby permanently injuring him, it would be your duty to return a verdict of guilty. If you do not so find or have a reasonable doubt as to one or more of these things, it would be your duty to return a verdict of not guilty.
